Gifts and Souvenirs. Gifts and souvenirs are available at the mezzanine lobby Gift Shop; before curtain, and during intermission, at most events.

Smoking. Fire regulations strictly prohibit smoking anywhere inside the Theatre.

Restrooms. Public restrooms are located on the orchestra and mezzanine levels.

Taxi Service. For your convenience, the House Manager or an usher will be happy to arrange for taxi service from the Theatre.

Personal Property/ Lost & Found. The management is not responsible for patrons' personal apparel or property. Lost and found inquiries may be directed to the House Manager on the evening of the event; and to the Hawaii Theatre Box Office after an event. All lost items are held in the Box Office and available during regular Box Office hours.

The Time Before

In ancient times, before the coming of the one God to Hawai'i, a fine veil separated the natural from the supernatural, and our people celebrated the world and their place in it. Their lives were governed by a multitude of gods, by their needs, by the natural world around them, by the phases of the moon, the stars, the seas, the seasons... Ho'oilo marked the time of winds and rains and the return of the god Lono—a god of peace, prosperity, and the abundance of the harvest. During the time of Lono, it was a time of plenty—of feasting, dancing games, and a feeling of goodwill prevailed across the land...

'O Lono i Ka Pō i Ke Ao hula kalā'au

It was during Ho'oilo that the sails of Captain Cook made its first appearance on the horizon. Thinking that the god Lono had returned, our people at first embraced the strange and wondrous men as gods. Though they realized the men were not godly, it was this first encounter that led to the knowledge of the one, true God in Hawai'i...

Nā Kumu Mea 'Ehā HULA PAHU

'Au'a'ia HULA PAHU—'AI HOLO "Tūtū, why do you always have a bowl of light in the corner during Christmas?"

"Oh, my little love, for tūtū, it reminds me of a story told to me by my tūtū kāne a long, long, time ago; when I asked him the very same thing"... "For each of us when born has at birth a bowl of perfect light. If we tend our light it will grow in strength and we can do all things...Swim with the shark... We can fly with the birds...We can know and understand all things...If, however, we become envious or jealous, we drop a stone into our bowl of light and some of the light goes out...For light and the stone cannot hold the same space...And if we continue to put stones into our bowl of light, the light will go out and we will become a stone. A stone does not move nor does it grow... But if at any time we tire of being a stone. all we need to do is turn the bowl upside down and the stones will fall away and the light...the light will shine once more..."

Amidst joyful singing and ritual, 30 men and women received the Holy Communion; in a Church filled with the scent of myrtle and orange boughs, along with native flowers. A silver candelabra, that was loaned by Kamehameha IV cast a blazing light throughout the church and the words "The word was made flesh" was displayed cross the altar. By 1:00am, the first observance of Christmas in the Hawaiian Islands had ended.

Today, the joy and celebration of Christmas takes on many forms... more often than not, it is always a time for family and friends, a time for parties, lū'au and gifts.

For all of us, Christmas begins in the memories of our youth, and continues throughout our lifetime to remind us of the importance of Manawale'a—Charity, Lokomaika'i—Generosity, Aloha—Love, and Maluhia—Peace.

This power we have, this gift from above, is our greatest gift from Him, this gift called love.


For with this gift we can accomplish all things
