I kept my goals very small so that I could fit my children into my life. My husband has also been my greatest helper. I owe so much to hula, more than anything elese. My goal as a teacher is to get the students to try their best to tell the audience what the song is all about, to feel what the writer hd in mind, to protray Hawaii in the' most dignified way and to shar that. The most important thing for a student is that the heart must be willing. Be doesn't matter. To tell a child you're too young is depriving the teacher and the studnet of a great experience because that's when you can nuture the love for the hula.

To see the students performing onstage is exhilirating. I cnan't see them for the front so I have to see them xxx from the response of the audience. When strangers come up to me and my girls look like they really enjoy what they're doing, it moves me because that has been one of mex my biggest goals when I started out/.

To see a little child go up onstage and forget about the audience, forget about t everthing else except the fact that she's dancing xxx is more important thant bringing hov a trophy. competition isxggg good. It makes you work, it makes everbody work together. It's n not just the children. It's the older students as m well. Seeing someone who has never had a chance to dance get that chance and love thehula is something to

I'm so fortunate to be in the middle of xx Rennaissance. Before flat paintings. With the Reinassanc3e, paintings became 3-demensional and full. I first thought the Hawaiian Reinaissance was a re-awakening because that's what the word meant to me in school. But as I reflect upon it and see wht's happening it's a time that's fostering new growth, it's a beginning for a new life andits not just a

re-awakening of past treasures. I'm really fortunate to be a part of that because it allows me my freedom to grow as an individual. I respect the old ways and I'm thankfull for the old kumu that are procticing the old ways. I will study with tjem befor I die but I cannot help but be what ;I am as the others will end up doing what is right for them. I think the competitions have created a new style. Everybody comes together and ;is able to borrov from everybody else. So It was important to me to register my we own style and ten say to everbody here is my kumu's style and now you may use it in whatever way it will help you.

Kahiko is simple. Idon't have the ability to simplify. I would have to x stri½ myself down to doredom. It's just not in my nature. I really do want to learn all the fundamentals of chanting and costume/.

The kahiko goes back to the very basis of fundamentals. Whether I protray that in my style of kahiko is another question.

I think you have to let the kumu alone in terms of EXEMMINS creativity in kahiko. You have to let the judges and the audience either accept or reject it on th their own. B But we do have to have those who keep it simple. I think people should be allowed to dance. and appreciate kahiko in the simple form and in the more creative form of today.

I love Pili Aloha the most out of the modern hulas althought that category spans such a great amount of songs. I think it protrays the poetry of Hawaii so beartifully. The Hawaiians did'nt have all these otherthings that clutter our lives. They had ther land and the plants, the flowers and other people. In the song everthing is interchanged and that's what they wrote about. The sone goes on to describe the rain falling down and this coupled along with my husband's love for the song make it my favorite.

I have a passion for it. When I saw La Boheme for the first time, it was the hula to to me. Rrom the time the curtain opened and the first movement of the first actor. It was the hula. People see the hula as only a native dance. They don't x realize that just as there are countless ways to stage \*\*\*Carmen," there are numerous ways to protray a cahant or a song. It is an art. I hope to see the world recognize; it. Iolani Luahinedid a lot t show that it \*\*x\*\* is a didnified, beautifu, artistic thing. It is not just a native classical dance. It is a fine art. It's more \*\*xhax\*\* than fold dancing. It's more than a few steps here and ther and hopping around to any old music. Mer's a story to tell and every motion in the dance is telling apart of that story. It's like ballet except were allowd because of the Hawaiian's openess of emotions to give out \*\*xon\*\*\* more than a ballerina is allowed to. I think \*\*xhax\*\* that's what Kalakaua fezzz felt when he went around the world. because he knew in the Hawaiina CUlture he had something profound to share.

XWERT Whenever I WEX hear the wordmaka ona ona in songs I think of my mother because to me she has the most beautiful eyes. I've ever seen. She had to raise a large family and had a hard life but to see her on stage for a pageant or a political rally, the hual lifted wher above everyday life, away from the worries and the sadness. When she danced the hual, life was beautiful.
