



entitling her to keep the perpetual trophy.



Kaua'i keikis place first in state

The troupe from Leilani's Keiki Hula Halau won the highest award at the 11th Annual Queen Liliuokalani Keiki Hula Competition held recently on O'ahu.

The group of thirteen won first place in the Mary Kawena Pukui Hawaiian Language category. Each halau is given the same kahiko (ancient hula) chant prior to the competition. The group that best articulates and interprets the chant while expertly pronouncing the Hawaiian language is given that award.

"I taught them the meaning of the chant so they would have feeling" when they perform, said Leilani Rivera Bond, kumu hula. "They worked real hard on the chant and did a wonderful job," she said.

The children, ranging in age from 6 to 12 years, was up against 27 other halaus from around the state in this competition commemorating the birthday of Queen Liliuokalani.

The other four categories of the competition were Kahiko, Awana (modern hula), Master Keiki Hula Soloist, and Miss Keiki Hula Soloist.

Floyd "Sonson" Espinosa, 8.

danced the "Hu c Hu-e," a paniolo (cowboy) awana and captured second place in the Awana category. He won a koa jewelry box for his accomplishment.

The group won \$300 and a koa bowl as their awards for winning first place in the Hawaiian Language category. This is the first time Leilani's keiki halau won anything in this competition and Leilani has high hopes for winning more. "We need to win three more times to own the perpetual trophy (for the Hawaiian Language category) and we're going to go for it," she said.

Leilani Bond's reward is aloha spirit

direction of Kumu Hula Leilani Bond, recently returned from O'ahu where they won several hula honors.

"I've always believed the hula is a spiritual expression of aloha,' kumu hula Leilani explains, "It also means the responsibility I have to our kupuna of old and current to perpetuate the culture-oleo Hawai'i, na mele-to carry on traditions and customs that would have put a smile on the faces of our Hawaiian ancestors."

Although she is not of Hawaiian ancestry, she made it her purpose to do all she could to study and learn about this proud people and what they have to offer. "I feel I have an obligation to pass this knowledge and aloha to our kamali'i," says Bond, "If I have achieved this, then I am one with the Hawaiian heritage and it is one with me.'

She explains that during her career she has meet and been judged by some of Hawai'is most prominent and respected people in their field including; Uncle George Naope, Wayne Chang, Johnny Lum Ho, Kalani Akaka, John Hawaiian culture. Before listing the halau's accomplishments, Bond shares her view on the word "competition."

"Webster defines the word competition as: the act of competing, as for profit or prize. I have wrestled with this for quite some time and it never really settled in my spirit. I try to convey to my na haumana (students) that if it be that we compete, then I challenge them to compete against themselves to convey in the true spirit of aloha their sincere warmth and affection for their hula sisters here and abroad, to practice and exemplify what Hawaiians call 'ha'aha'a' (humility), and to perpetuate our

"If they have learned this, then I as their Kumu Hula have succeeded and no plaque, reward or prize will ever replace the inner peace I have with myself and my na haumana. Maybe someday there can be a first keiki hula 'exhibition' where na halau from all islands come to just-perform."

Achievements earned by the Leilani Hula Halau include:

1993 Kaua'i Aloha Week-First runner up Keikie Kane, second place team Kaikamahine Kahiko and Auana

1993 Hula 'Oni E-5th place Kaikamahine group Auana category, 3rd place Kaikamahine group Kahiko category, and 3rd place Miss Keiki Hula 'Oni E (soloist)

1993 Liliuokalani-4th place Master Keiki Hula

1992 Liliuoklani-1st runner up Master Keiki Hula.

Other awards include: Mary Kawena Pukui Hawaiian Language Perpetual Trophy presented at the Liliuokalani Keiki competition.

Bond relates that in this year's Hula 'Oni E, the scoring was very close, within a couple of points between the top winners, with Kaua'i's dancers making an exceptional showing.

The Hula 'Oni E competition is scheduled to be broadcast on KGMB channel 4 on in November.








Coconut Coast cuties

This perpetual trophy, donated by K.A.H.I. in the name of the late Mary Kawena Pukui in recognition of her tremendous contributions toward the preservation of the Hawaiian language and the perpetuation of the Hawaiian culture must be won by the same halau for three consecutive years in order to retain it.

By offering these awards, the Kalihi-Palama Culture & Arts Society, Inc. hopes to nurture an awareness of the importance of the Hawaiian language to the overall performance of the traditional stylings of hula.
